while ethics has been addressed in the health care literature relatively little attention has been paid to the subject in the field of social care this book redresses the balance by examining theory research policy and practice in both fields the analysis is set within the context of contemporary challenges facing health and social care not only in britain but internationally contributors from the uk us and australia consider ethical issues in health and social care research and governance interprofessional and user perspectives ethics in relation to human rights the law finance management and provision key issues of relevance to vulnerable groups such as children and young people those with complex disabilities older people and those with mental health problems and lifecourse issues ethical perspectives on a range of challenging areas from new technologies of reproduction to euthanasia this book is intended for academics students and researchers in health and social care who need an up to date analysis of contemporary issues and debates it will also be useful to practitioners in the public private and voluntary sectors including social workers community workers those working in the fields of disability and mental health and with older people

provides an overview of the british legal and ethical issues that nurses and other health professionals come across hendrick oxford brookes u discusses the relationship between law and ethics and how at times they overlap or diverge chapters include case studies theoretical discussion possible outcomes and a summary of how the legal and ethical approaches compare they also examine the patient client relationship confidentiality consent responsibility and accountability as well as the relationship between the law codes of practice and health care circulars the book includes guidelines from professional bodies distributed in the us by isbs c book news inc

there can be few aspects of life which have altered so dramatically in the past few decades as the relationship between medicine and the law treatments become more and more sophisticated as each advance in medicine is made at the same time the legal and moral issues

surrounding such treatments have multiplied and have become increasingly sensitive and complex introducing the reader to important topics which include genetics consent negligence research assisted reproduction and mental health the book outlines what the current law is why it is so and what it may become in the future legal and ethical aspects of healthcare is written by a lawyer and a doctor each with extensive practical experience in the field it provides wide ranging coverage of the most important ethical and moral issues that face healthcare professionals lawyers and the general public alike and it offers a unique insight into the problems that healthcare providers and patients can be expected to encounter both today and in the future all healthcare professionals at any level of training or practice lawyers and interested members of the general public book jacket

ethics for health care considers ethics in the context of routine health care it follows a sequence that is familiar in health care education and practice training adopting a profession becoming a team member in a health care setting beginning to see clients and working with clients as their treatment progresses while the theory of health care ethics is a central feature of the discussion the book moves beyond the traditional theory oriented organisation of most ethics texts to a structure that is generated by practical professional and client needs focusing

on the interaction between health care provider and client it draws on practical experience and contemporary issues in its exploration of the ethical choices that must be made in health care readers are encouraged to relate the ideas presented to their own views and experiences and to answer questions as they read ethical issues are a feature of the everyday work of health professionals this book is designed to equip health care students and health professionals with the skills and knowledge to deal with these concerns

this text engages students with the ethical decisions faced by health care professionals every day based on principles and applications in health care ethics and the law this text extends beyond areas that are often included in discussions of political philosophy and the principles of justice

the goal of this open access book is to develop an approach to clinical health care ethics that is more accessible to and usable by health professionals than the now dominant approaches that focus for example on the application of ethical principles the book elaborates the view that health professionals have the emotional and intellectual resources to discuss and address ethical issues in clinical health care without needing to rely on the expertise of bioethicists the early chapters review the history of bioethics and explain how academics from outside health care came to dominate the field of health care ethics both in professional schools and in clinical health care the middle chapters elaborate a series of concepts drawn from philosophy and the social sciences that set the stage for developing a framework that builds upon the individual moral experience of health professionals that explains the discontinuities between the demands of bioethics and the experience and perceptions of health professionals and that enables the articulation of a full theory of clinical ethics with clinicians themselves as the foundation against that background the first of three chapters on professional education presents a general framework for teaching clinical ethics the second discusses how to integrate ethics into formal health care curricula and the third addresses the opportunities for teaching available in clinical settings the final chapter empowering clinicians brings together the various dimensions of the argument and anticipates potential questions about the framework developed in earlier chapters

here erich h loewy expands on his earlier book textbook of medical ethics 1989 offering healthcare workers and students a new perspective on ethical practice textbook of healthcare ethics focuses on the social conditions in which medical practice occurs and how ethical healthcare decisions involves nurses social workers psychologists technicians and patients as well as physicians this thoroughly revised and expanded edition addresses historical and theoretical underpinnings and practical concerns a series of case studies serve as a guideline for further discussion the text examines provocative issues such as organ donation care of the terminally ill abortion hiv positive healthcare professionals physician assisted suicide and experimentation with fetal tissue this is an ideal book for all members of the healthcare team as well as students and residents in any discipline of medicine

this volume is the result of a conference sponsored by the medical alumni association of the university of california davis and held in sacramento california in january 2000 the purpose of this conference was to examine the impact of various health care structures on the ability of health care professionals to practice in an ethically acceptable manner one of the ground

assumptions made is that ethical practice in medicine and its related fields is difficult in a setting that pays only lip service to ethical principles the limits of ethical possibility are created by the system within which health care professionals must practice when for example ethical practice necessitates as it generally does that health care professionals spend sufficient time to come to know and understand their patients goals and values but the system mandates that only a short time be spent with each patient ethical practice is made virtually impossible one of our chief frustrations in teaching health care ethics at medical colleges is that we essentially teach students to do something they are most likely to find impossible to do that is get to know and appreciate their patients goals and values there are other ways in which systems alter ethical possibilities in a system in which patients have a different physician outside the hospital than they will inside ethical problems have a different shape than if the treating physician is the same person

should organ transplants be given to patients who have waited the longest or need it most urgently or those whose survival prospects are the best the rationing of health care is universal and inevitable taking place in poor and affluent countries in publicly funded and private health care systems someone must budget for as well as dispense health care whilst aging populations severely stretch the availability of resources the ethics of health care rationing is a clear and much needed introduction to this increasingly important topic considering and assessing the major ethical problems and dilemmas about the allocation scarcity and rationing of health care beginning with a helpful overview of why rationing is an ethical problem the authors examine the following key topics what is the value of health how can it be measured what does it mean that a treatment is good value for money what sort of distributive principles utilitarian egalitarian or prioritarian should we rely on when thinking about health care rationing does rationing health care unfairly discriminate against the elderly and people with disabilities should patients be held responsible for their health why does the debate on responsibility for health lead to issues about socioeconomic status and social inequality throughout the book examples from the us uk and other countries are used to illustrate the ethical issues at stake additional features such as chapter summaries annotated further reading and discussion questions make this an ideal starting point for students new to the subject not only in philosophy but also in closely related fields such as politics health economics public health medicine nursing and social work

now in its second edition law and ethics in nursing and healthcare an introduction continues to provide all the information nursing and healthcare students need to know about what is legal and how to decide what is right in order to practise safely and ethically graham avery focuses directly on the vital areas such as negligence consent confidentiality and professional conduct with a practical and accessible approach aimed at healthcare students as well as practitioners key features include a new chapter on deprivation of liberty safeguards up to date information related to the health and social care act 2012 and the francis report real life case studies to help students think critically about difficult clinical situations end of chapter scenarios activities with suggested answers to reinforce knowledge qualified as a registered nurse and holding an ma in medical law and ethics graham avery is a lecturer at the university of essex
